From 25-26 February, <u>Noel Morada</u> participated in a workshop and public seminar organised by the <u>Cardozo School of Law</u>, Yeshiva University and the <u>Auschwitz Institute for Peace and Reconciliation</u> in New York. The workshop and seminar, entitled "Deconstructing Prevention: The Theory, Policy, and Practice of Mass Atrocity Prevention", examined various issues and challenges related to prevention of genocide and mass atrocities. Presenters and participants included scholars, diplomats, civil society, and practitioners from the United Nations and those involved in peacekeeping operations.

From 18-20 March, <u>Noel</u> also participated in a high-level working meeting in Dar Es Salaam, Tanzania on Prevention of Atrocities jointly organised by the foreign ministries of Switzerland and Tanzania. The main objective of the meeting was to develop a concrete and pragmatic reflection of various approaches to developing national strategies for mass atrocities prevention. It also aimed to strengthen the emergence of a "Community of Commitment" in this field by developing synergies among national focal points on R2P and by strengthening exchanges in experiences, good practices, and lessons learned at national and regional levels.

On 21 March the Institute for Social Science Research hosted a book launch for Bryn Hughes, Charles T. Hunt and Jodie Curth-Bibb on their new book 'Forging New Conventional Wisdom Beyond International Policing: Learning from Complex, Political Realities'. The book emphasizes the need to understand peace missions from the vantage points of those affected by them and to include them in operational design and planning.

The ISA Annual Convention was held in San Francisco on 3 April – 6 April 2013. <u>Tim Dunne</u> attended the Conference as a member of the Governing Council. Both <u>Tim Dunne</u> and <u>Kath Gelber</u> attended a pre-ISA workshop on R2P. <u>Sarah Teitt</u> presented a paper on China and Humanitarianism, and <u>Charles Hunt</u> also attended the Conference.

On Wednesday 24 April the Centre hosted a Roundtable on Extending gender justice to post conflict states. Australian Research Council Future Fellow, <u>Louise Chappell</u> (<u>University of New South Wales</u>) discussed the ICC's complementarity regime, focusing on its problems and its prospects for improving gender justice.
